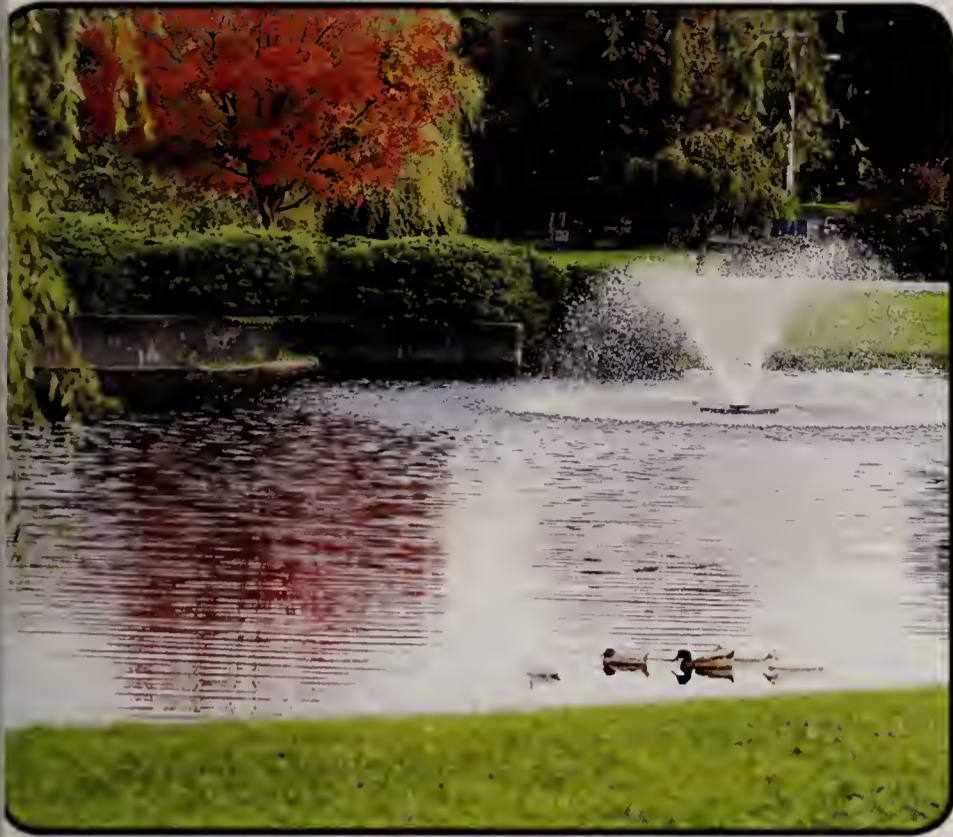

Thank You and Farewell, Mr. President

Just as the Class of 2007 moved on, the residents of 540 Salisbury Street moved out. Assumption was led by President and Mrs. Plough for the years of 1998-2007, and to them we formally dedicate this yearbook. We are indebted to their devotion, work, and care as the heads of the AC community.

How did Tom and Monty pave the way that led them to Assumption's campus?

The oldest of five children, Thomas R. Plough was born to hardworking parents, a fireman father and mother who worked as a secretary. He graduated second in his class at St. Francis High School in Traverse City, Michigan in 1959, and was pushed by his teachers to pursue the engineering field. Things were different in college, however, when he changed majors seven times and realized he had no idea what he wanted to do. He graduated from Michigan State University with a Bachelor's degree in social science, and was the first member of his family to attend college.



He left with more than just an education. Dr. Plough spent his sophomore to senior years working as an RA in the residence halls. It was here that he met Monty, a fellow RA and student a year behind him. There was an instant connection between the two, and love blossomed.

Following graduation in 1963, Plough went to Beachcomb, Hawaii, while Monty studied in Paris at the Sorbonne. Their time apart had no effect on their relationship, and they married in 1964 in East Lansing, Michigan.

In time, Plough became Dean of Students at Alma College in Alma, Michigan, as well as a professor of sociology; Monty was Director of Women's Off-Campus Housing and a French professor. The Ploughs' next opportunity came at the Rochester Institute of Technology, in Rochester, NY, where Tom took the position of Provost Chief Academic officer and tenured professor of Sociology.



As President of North Dakota State in Fargo, North Dakota, Plough spent three years working with the chancellor, governor, and legislature in this position. When the Assumption President's position became available, Plough took the job with the intention of staying for five to seven years. The man who once held part-time jobs as zookeeper and heavy equipment worker credited his mentors in higher education and student life as facilitating his successes.

According to Plough, Assumption was the most collegial environment of all the other schools he had experience with, in addition to high levels of civility and friendliness. AC was a polite, courteous, and competent community.

Tom and Monty—along with their four sons Tom, Bill, Seth and John—shared life right on Assumption's campus. Seth Plough graduated from the University of Richmond, and took computer science and math courses to jumpstart his software engineering career. John Plough spent three years at Franklin and Marshall before graduating from Assumption. Another son celebrated his wedding at the Assumption home.

President Plough orchestrated many Assumption milestones during his career, including the Centennial campaign. While interviewing with the search committee, his specific goals were to raise the number and quality of the student body, make the facilities more competitive, reach out to alumni, create visibility in the Northeast based on successes, ensure a strong faculty, and foster a solid financial structure.

"It's fun to look at the facilities of the campus, but the most important thing is that people trust me," said Plough of his time at AC. "The satisfaction of the job is leaving the college in better shape than when you came in."

A typical day as President of Assumption was

anything but typical. Plough said the best a president can do each day is anticipate the challenges that might come from students, faculty and staff, the community, the state, or even the federal level, in addition to parents and trustees.

Dr. Plough played an instrumental role by strategically positioning the college for the next decade, where it will be carried by the new, high-energy president to follow him: Dr. Francesco Cesareo.

When asked for a message to graduating seniors from the Class of 2007, Plough responded: "You can compete with students from universities anywhere. With your strong values, professional and personal characters, graduates are very well qualified." Plough noted that Assumption alumni go on to advanced degrees, and have made successes of their lives.

"We've come a long way from the all-male, French prep school," he said. "Looking back on our history, it's amazing we're at this point today. I'm very proud of the school."

And Plough's favorite Assumption moment? "It would be tough to beat when my mom and dad were here for my inauguration. I awarded them my first two Presidential medals."

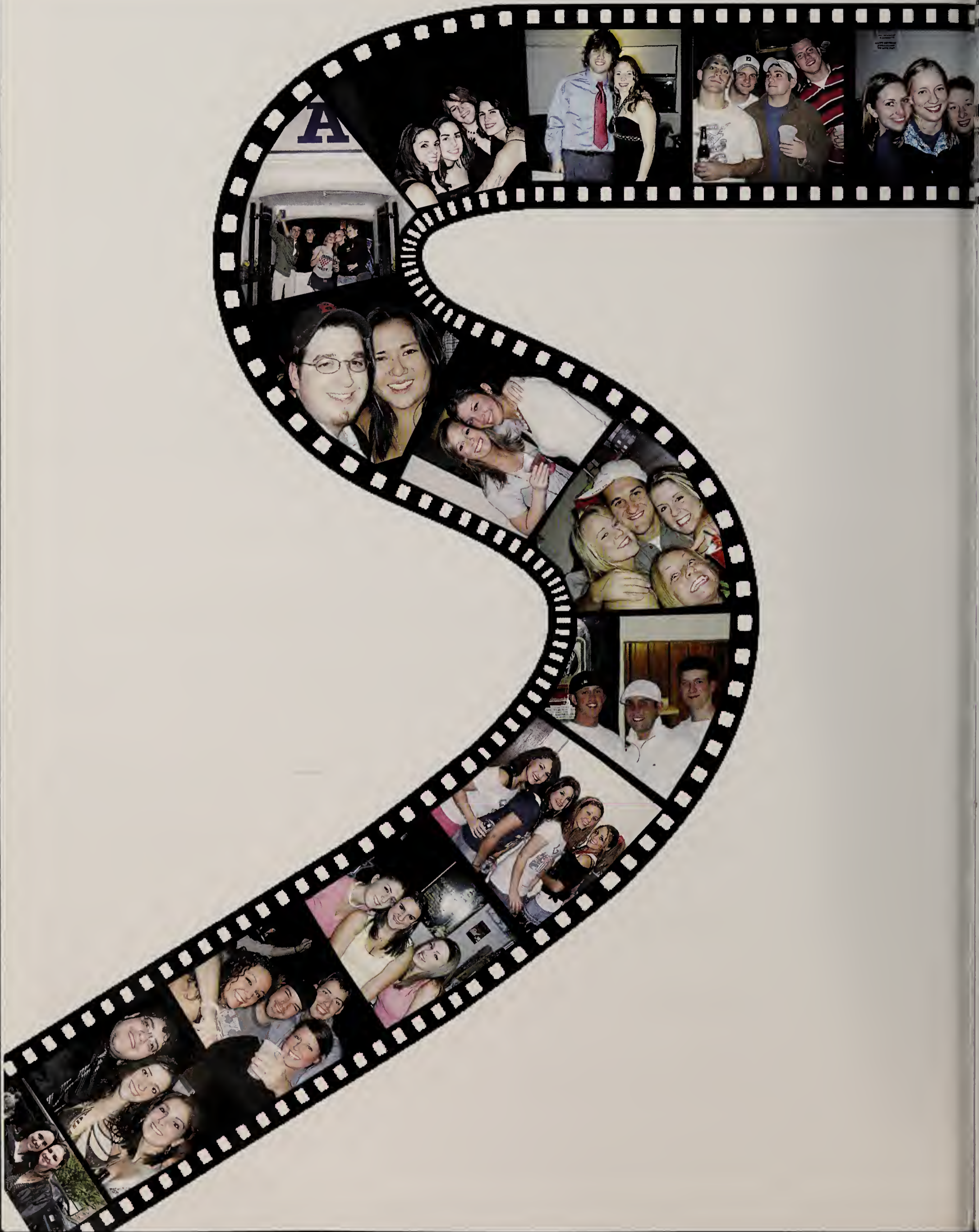

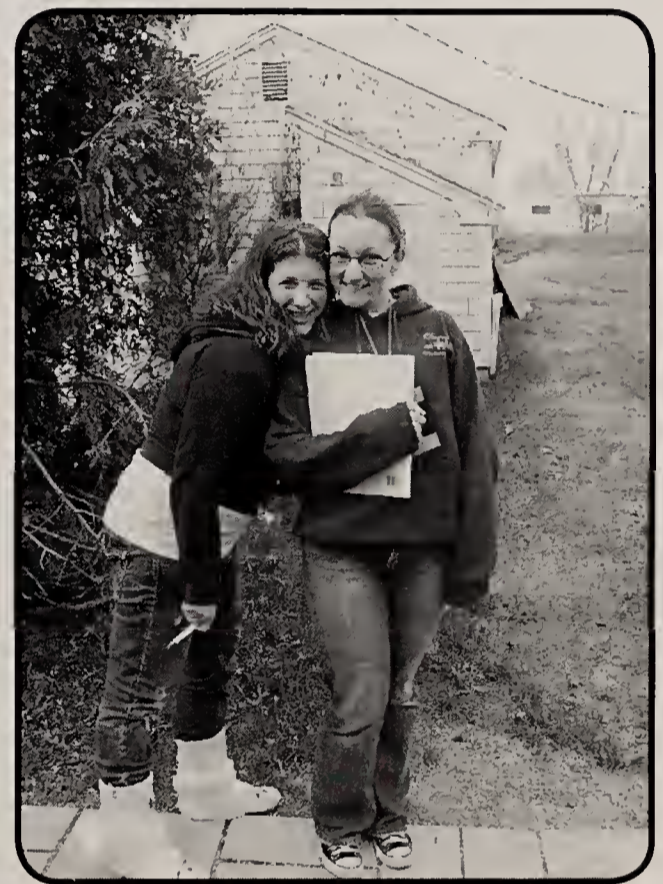

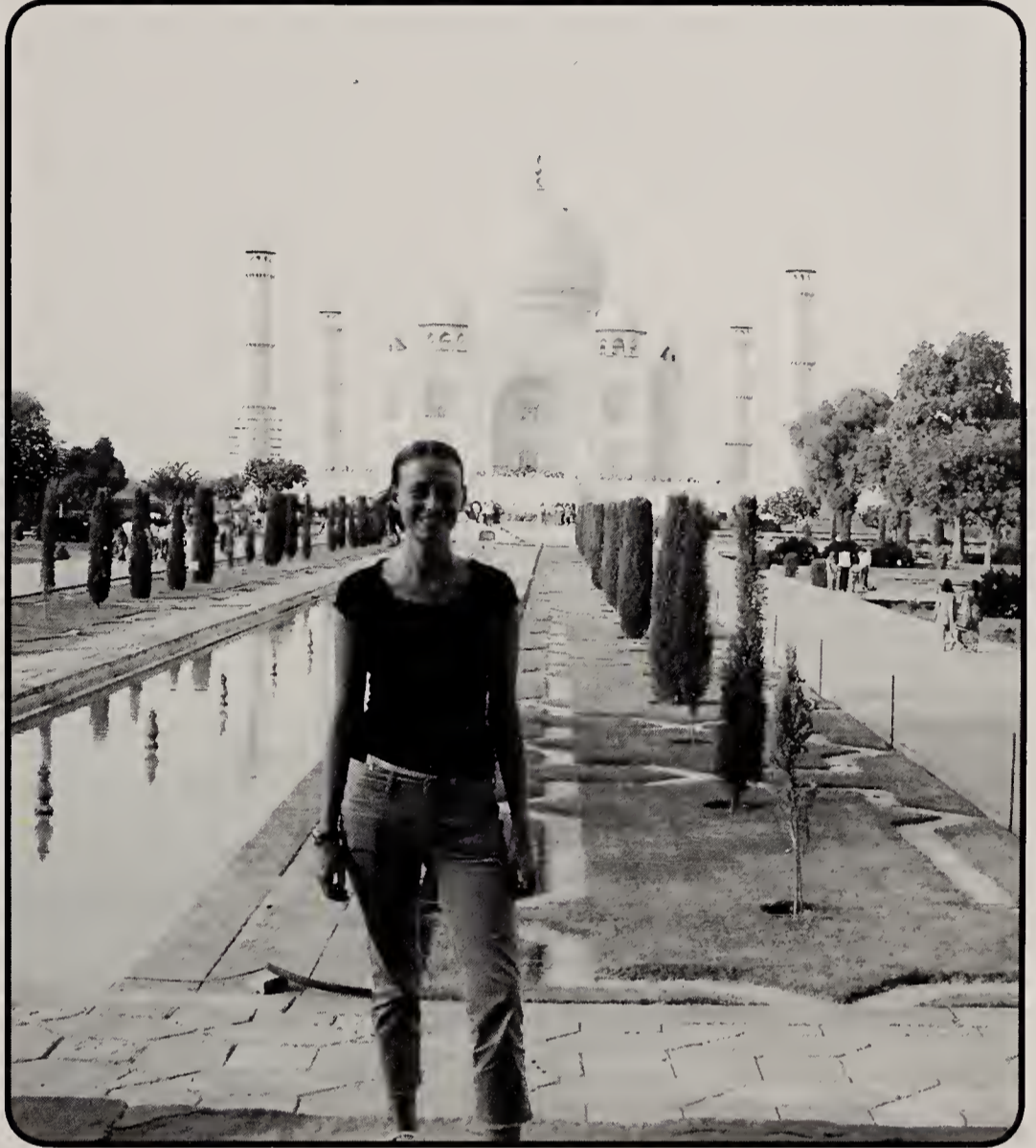

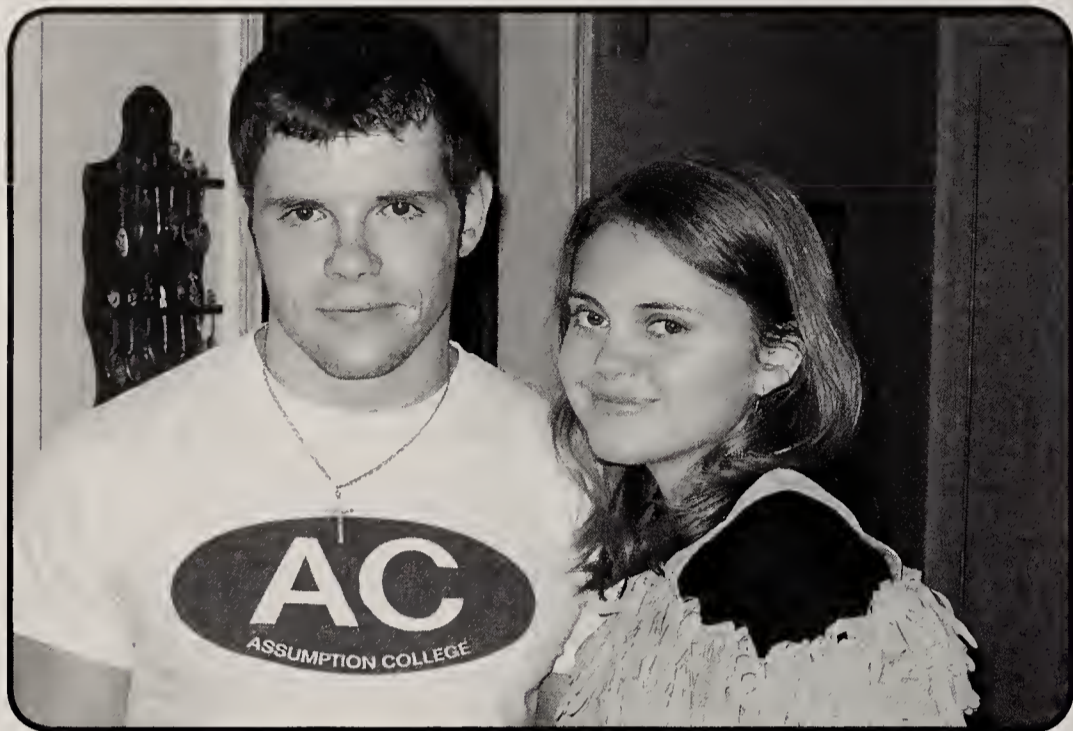

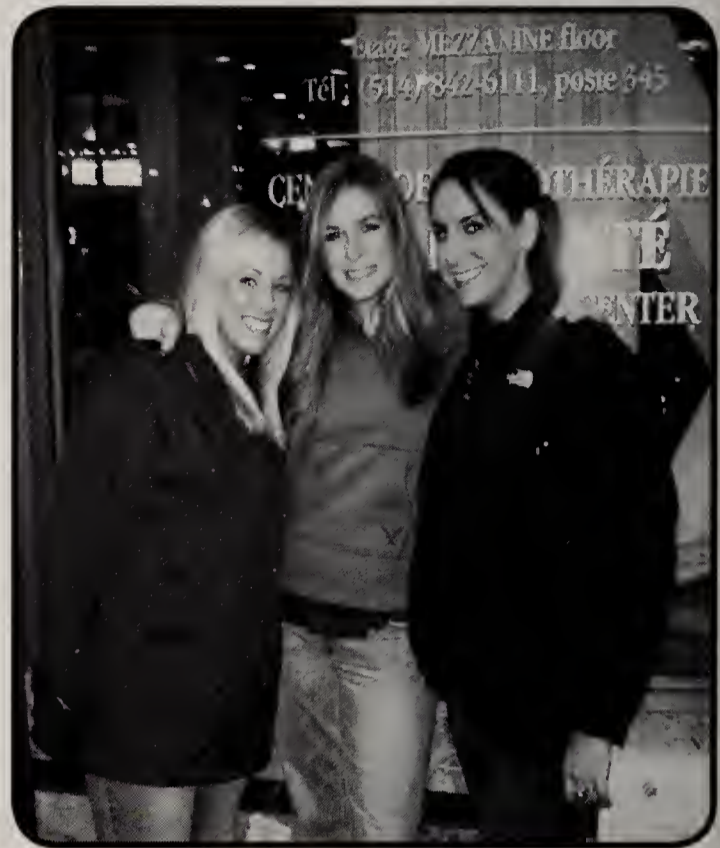
While some were smart enough to

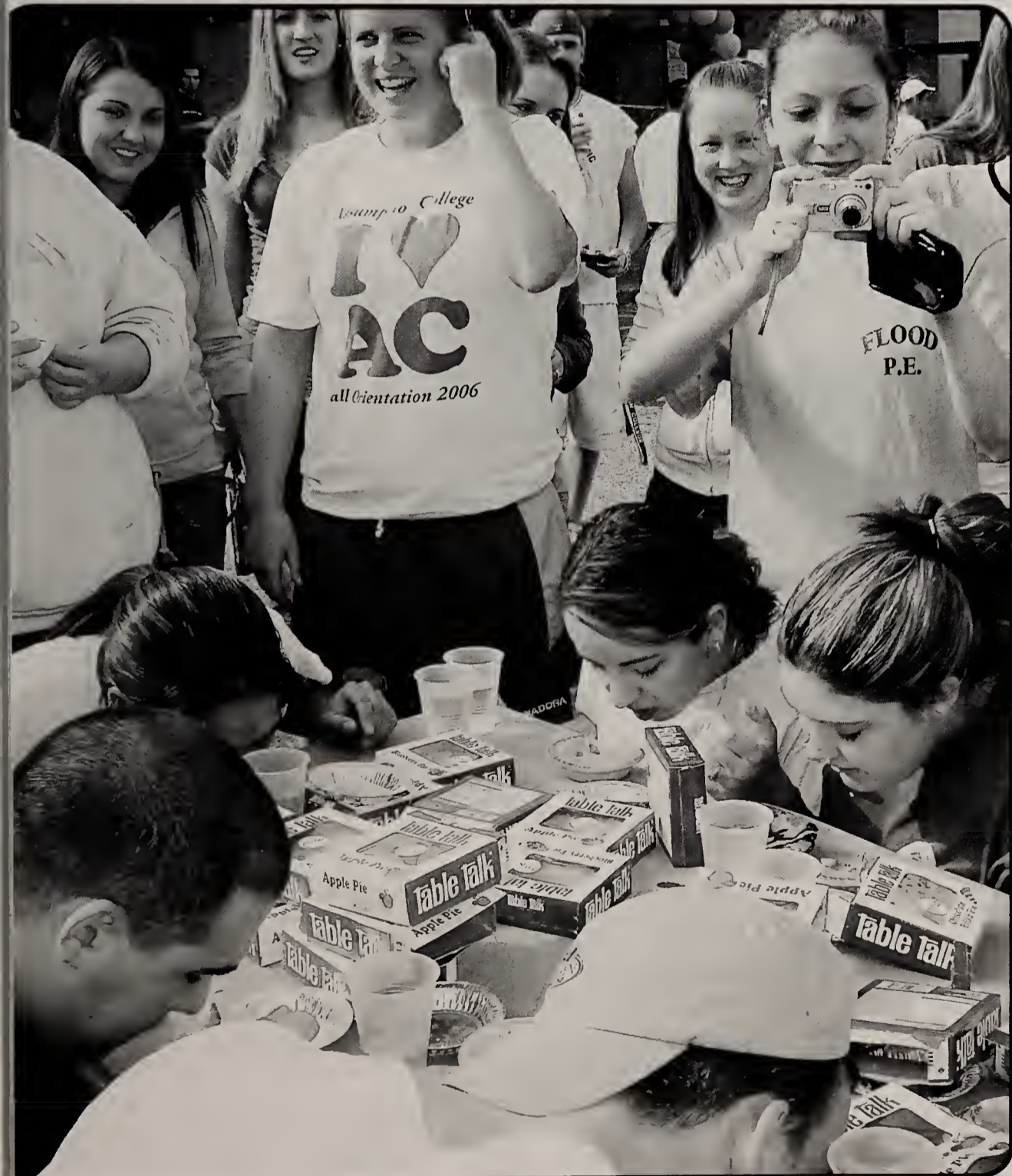

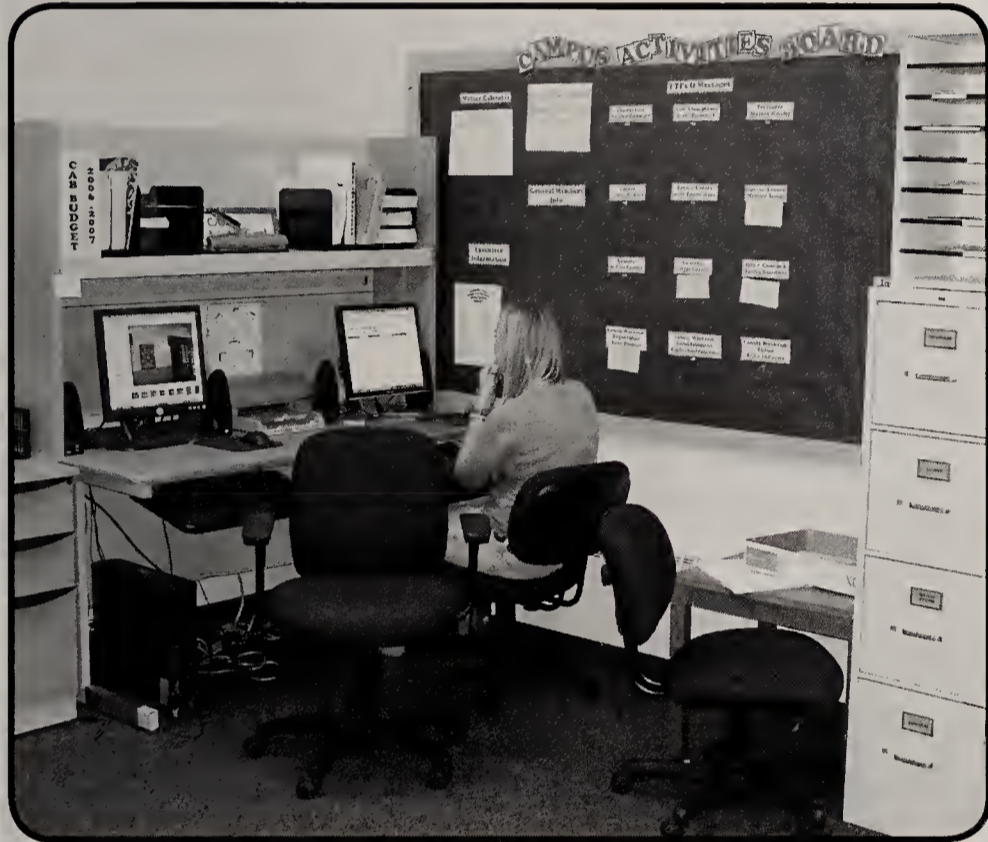
our siblings got shrunk during February's Siblings Weekend. The spring semester was capped off with the outdoor events Spring Fever and Last Day of Classes.

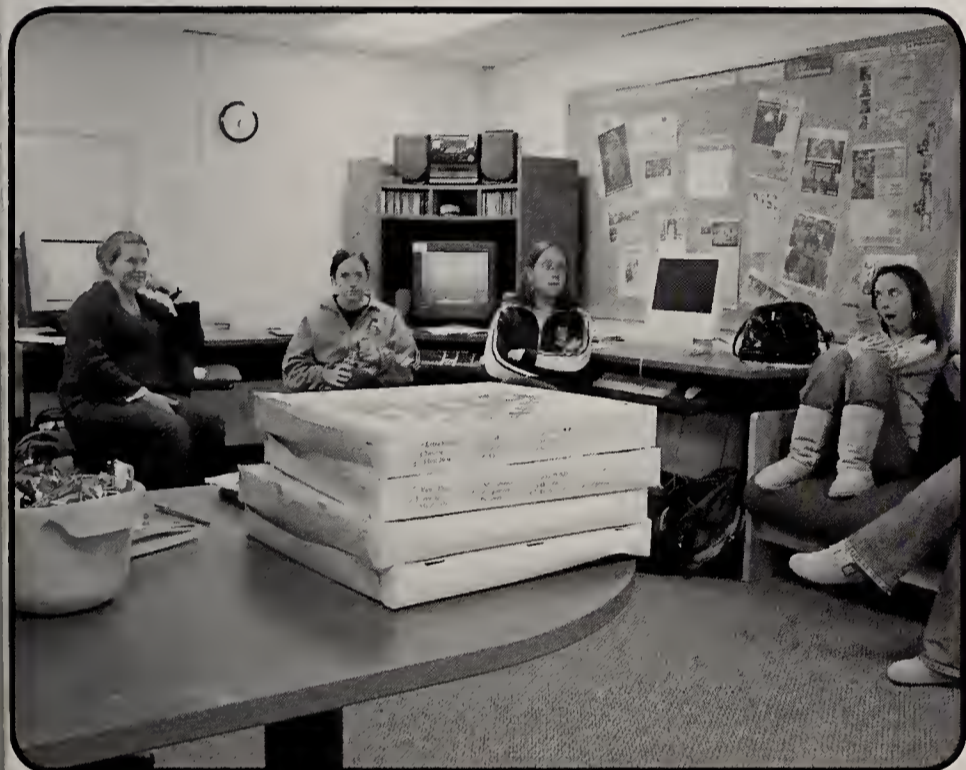
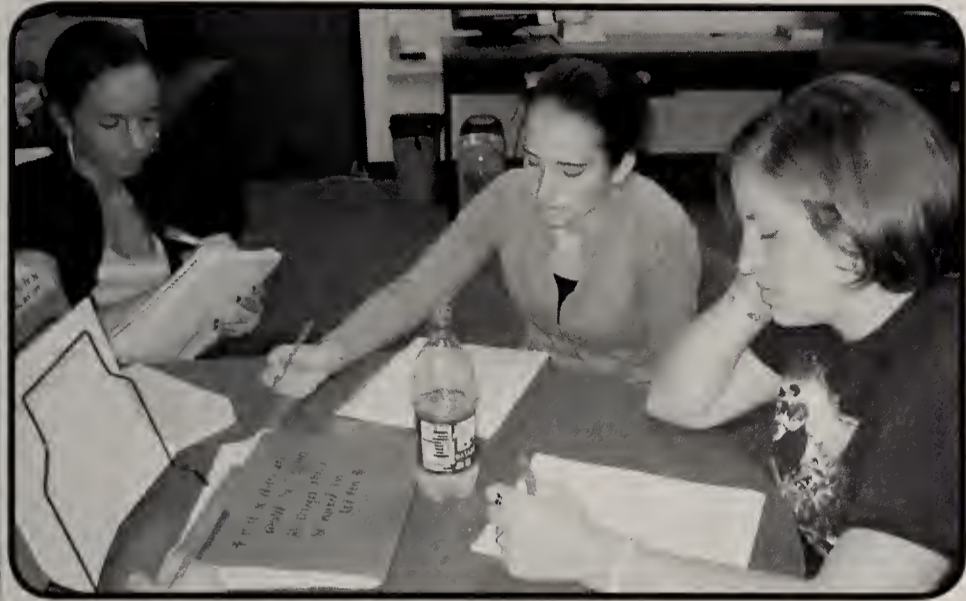
One front-page story from the

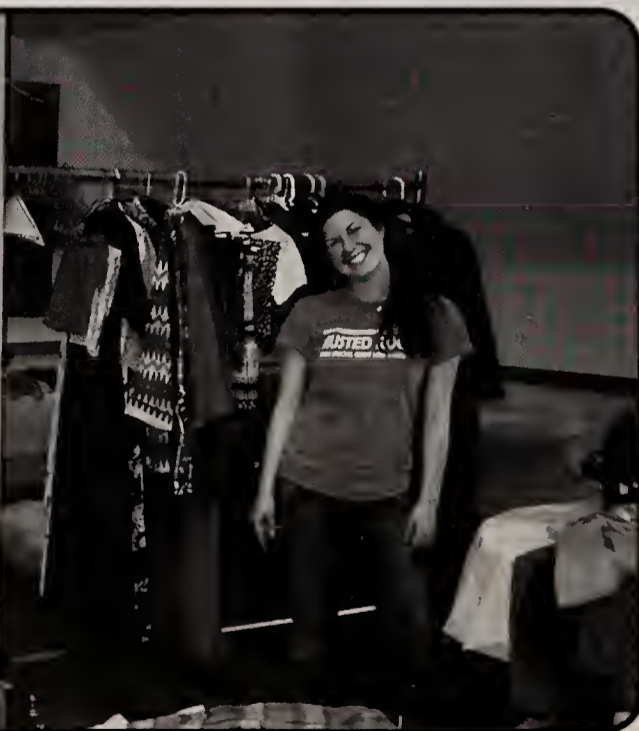

In the 2006 season, the Assumption College football team continued to make strides in becoming an annual contender in the Northeast 10 Conference. The 4-6 record was not indicative of the kind of season the Hounds had. Coach Cory Bailey's goal was to instill a winning attitude in his players. From the very first game of the year against the perennial powerhouse of C.W. Post, it was evident that something was different about this team.

During the fifth game of the season against Bentley, the Hounds came out firing, earning a thrilling 14-10 victory. 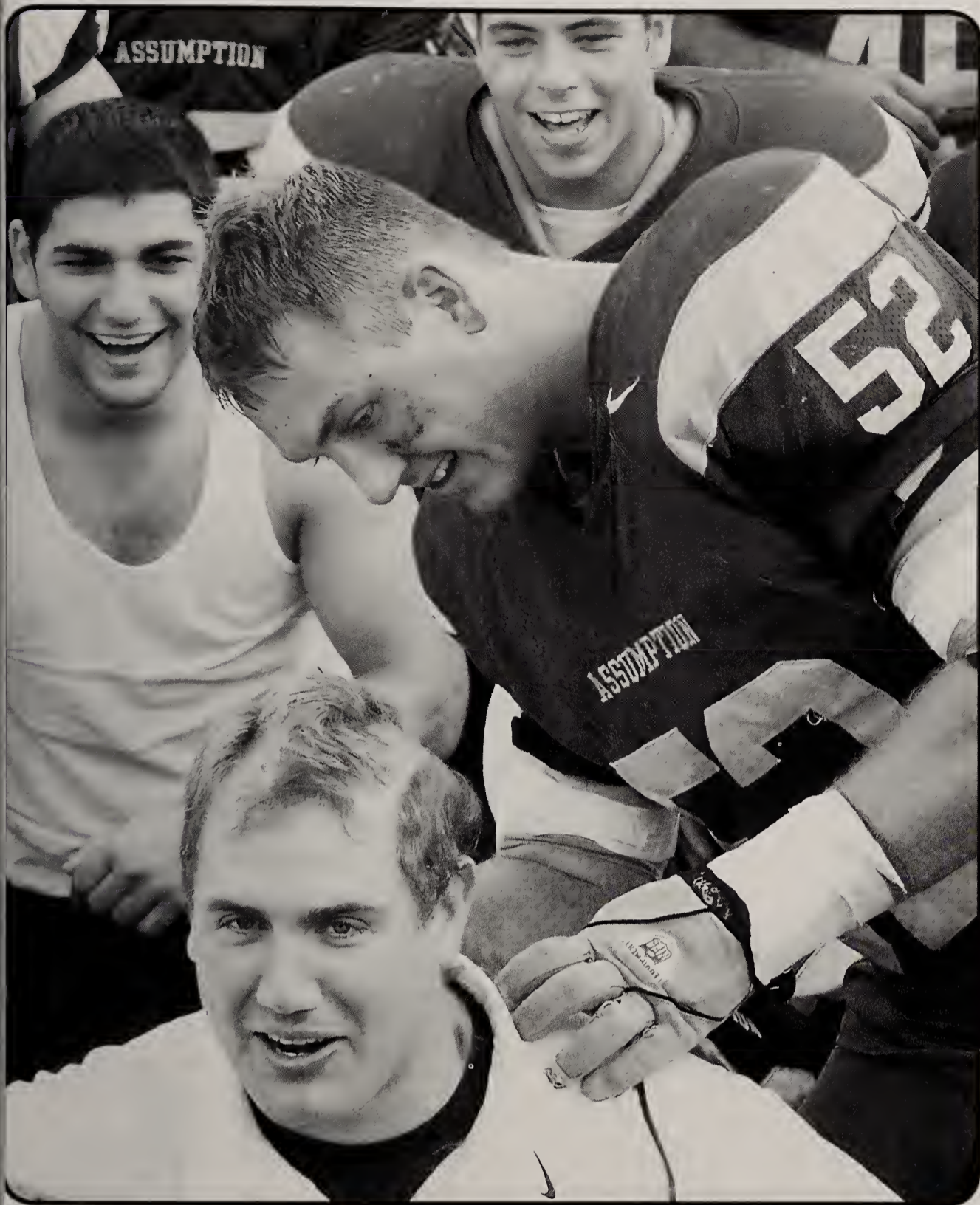

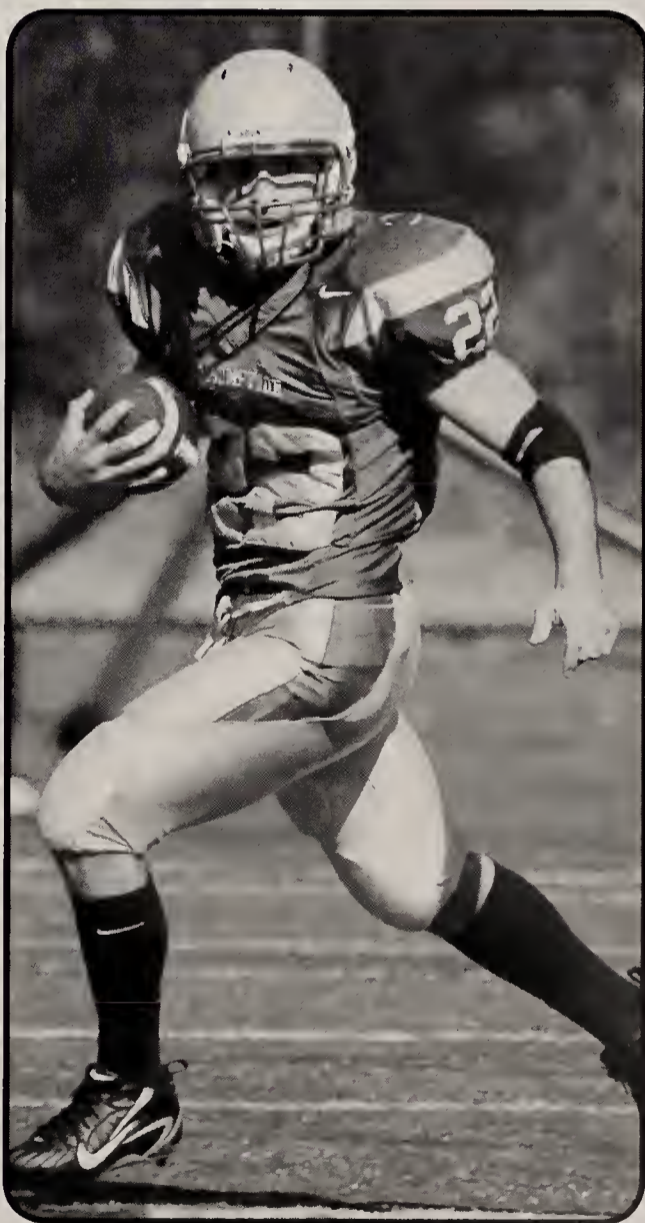

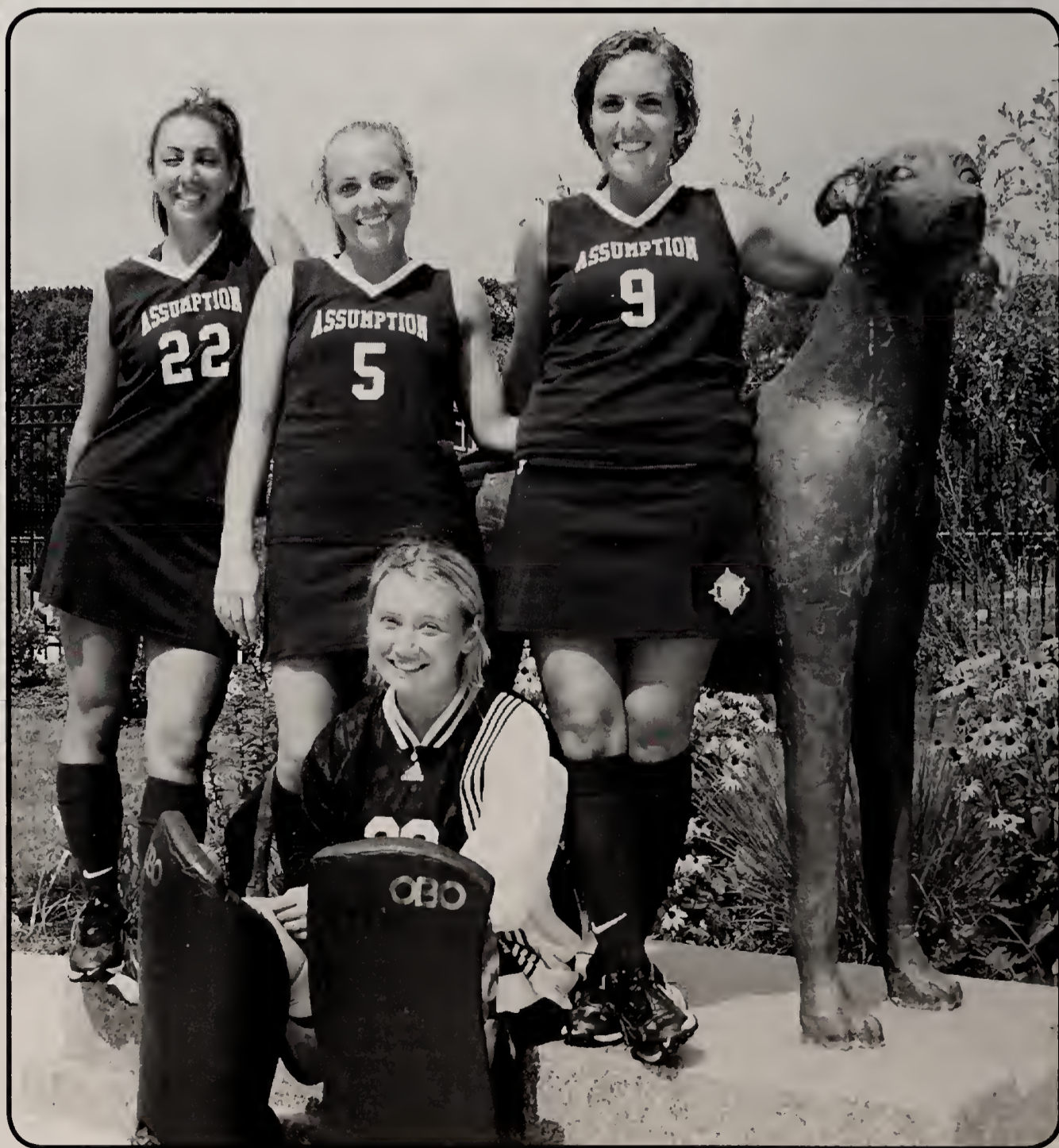

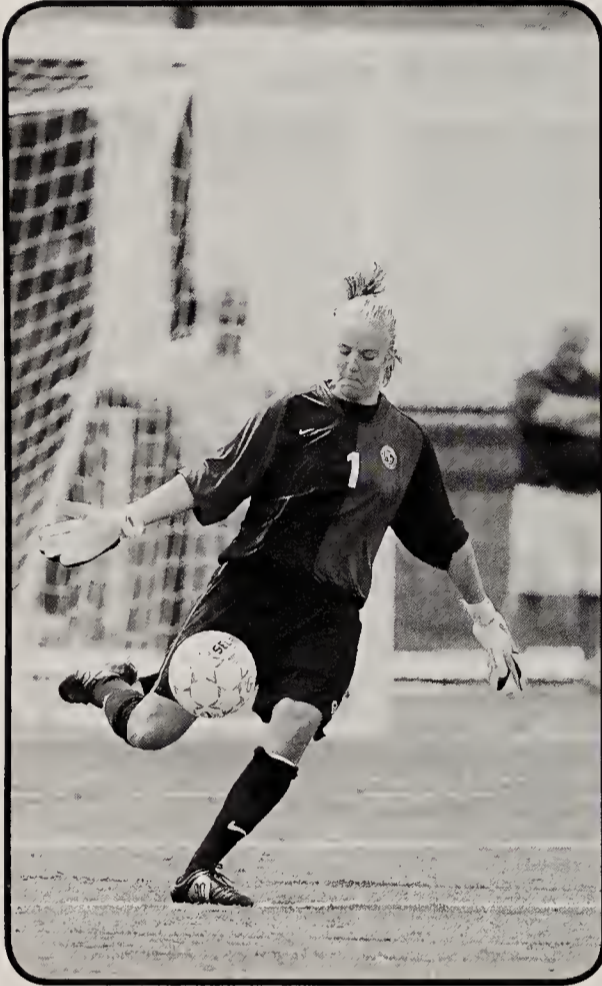

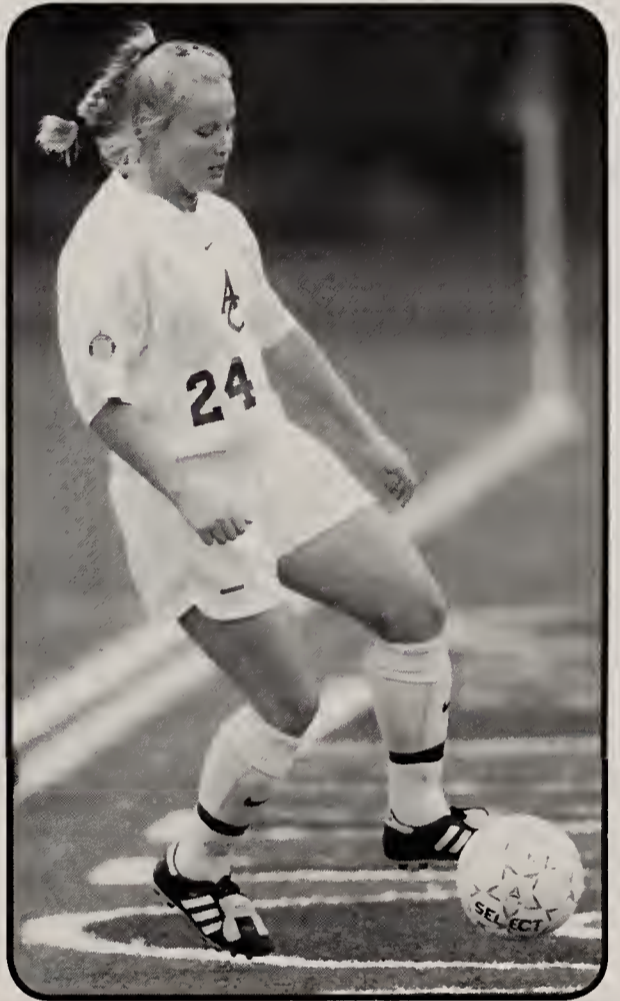
ful in the past few years.

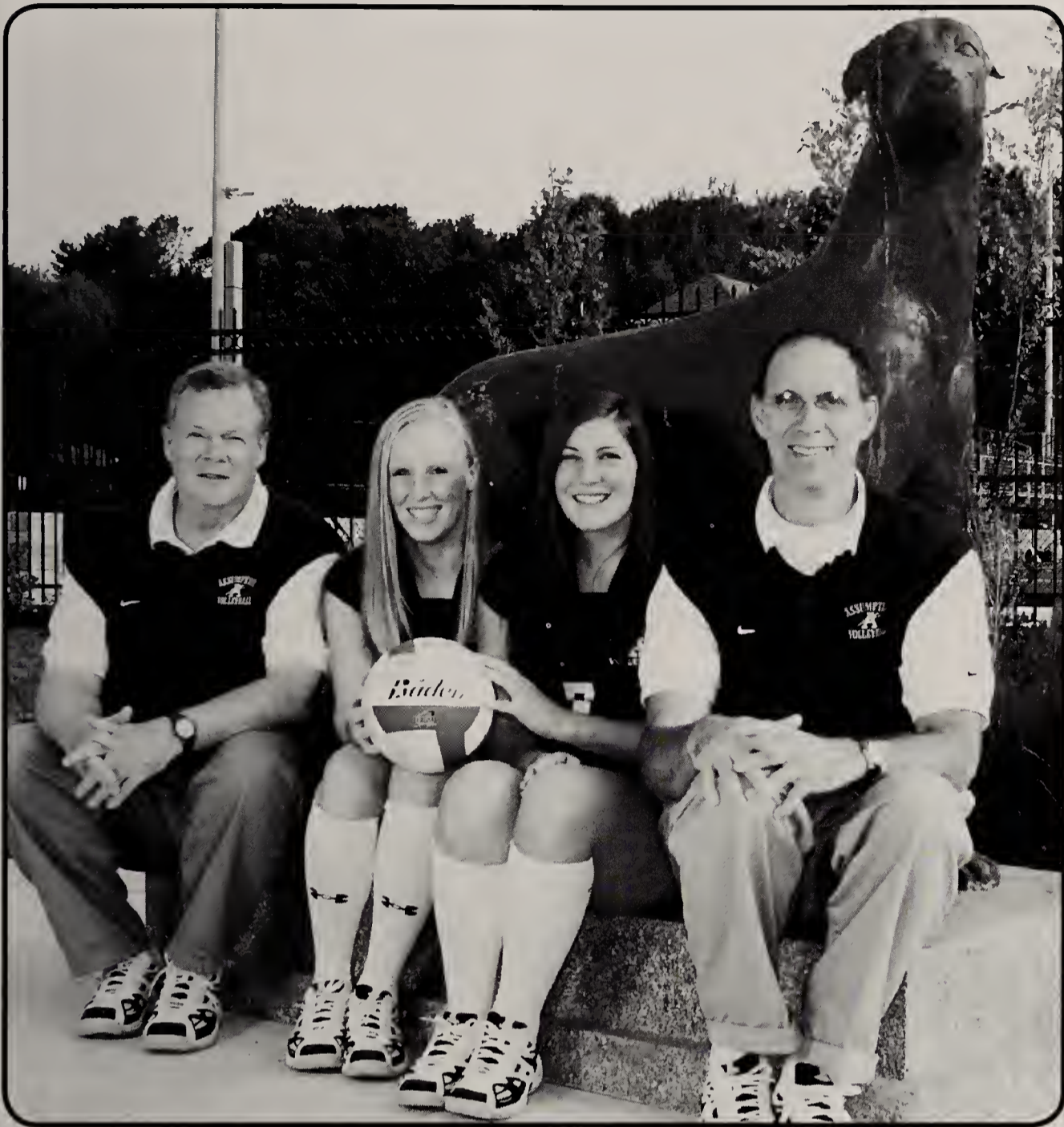

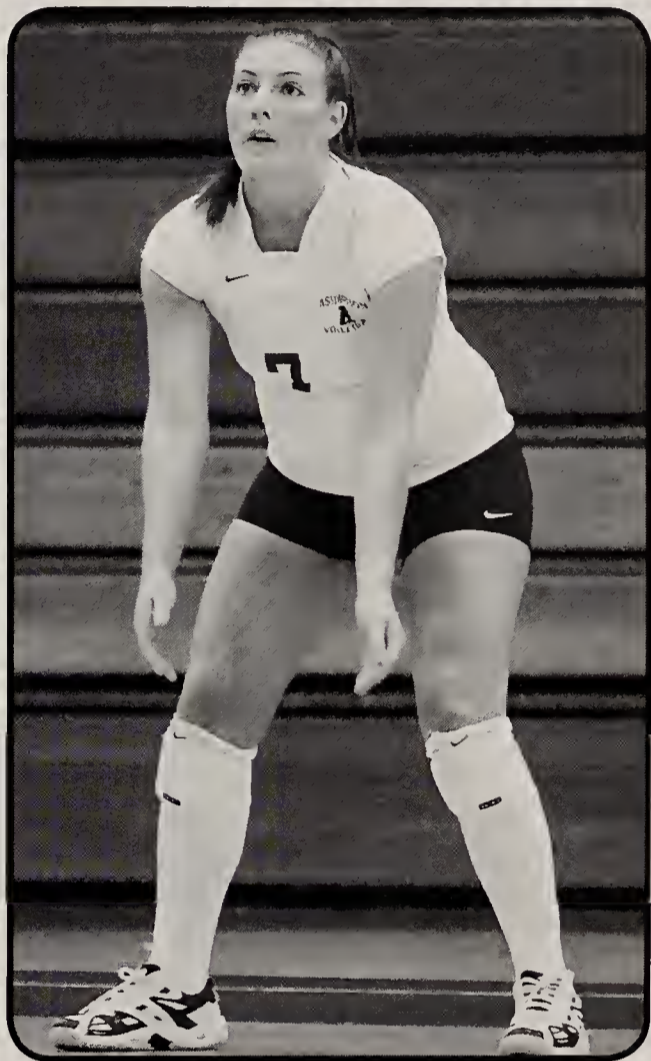

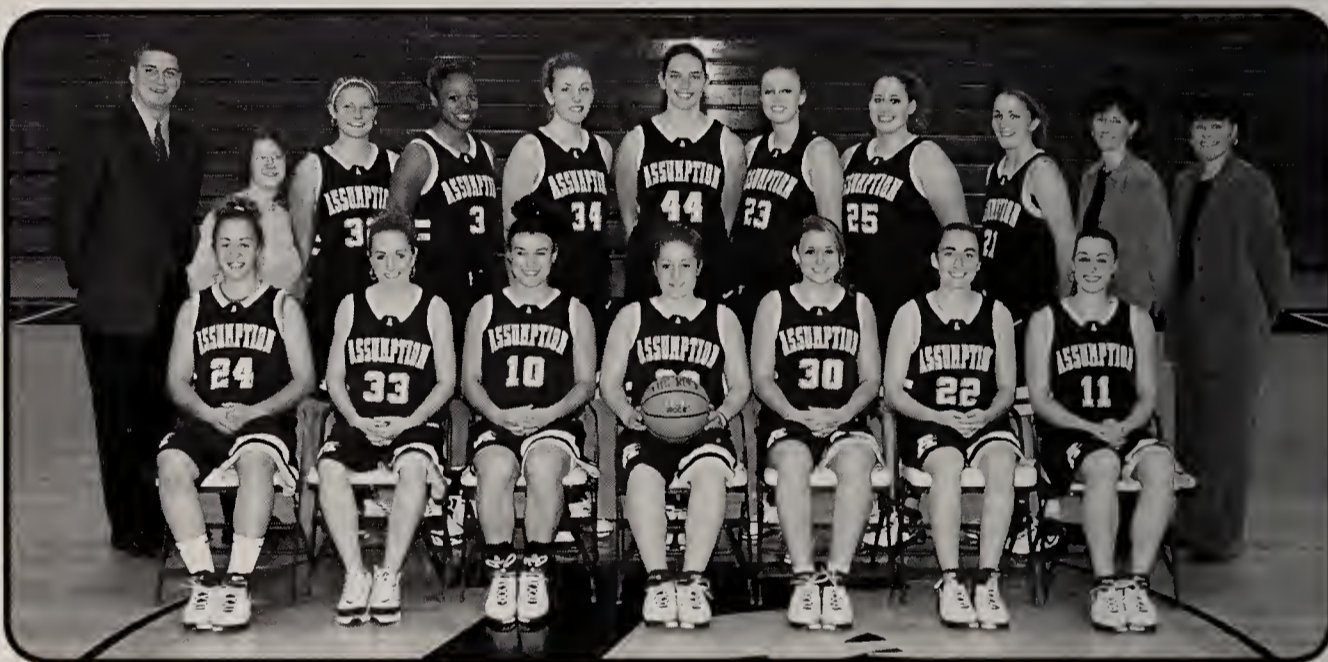
The team made it to the NE-10 playoffs, where they defeated Franklin Pierce to move on to the Quarter-Finals. From there, they faced Southern

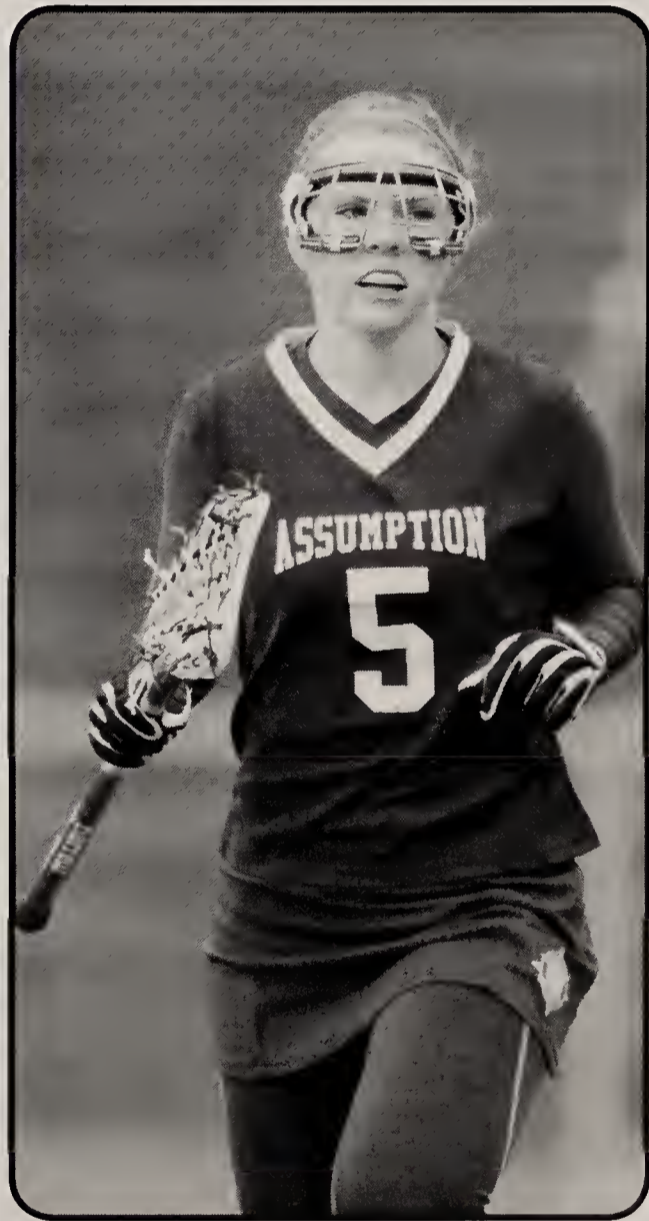

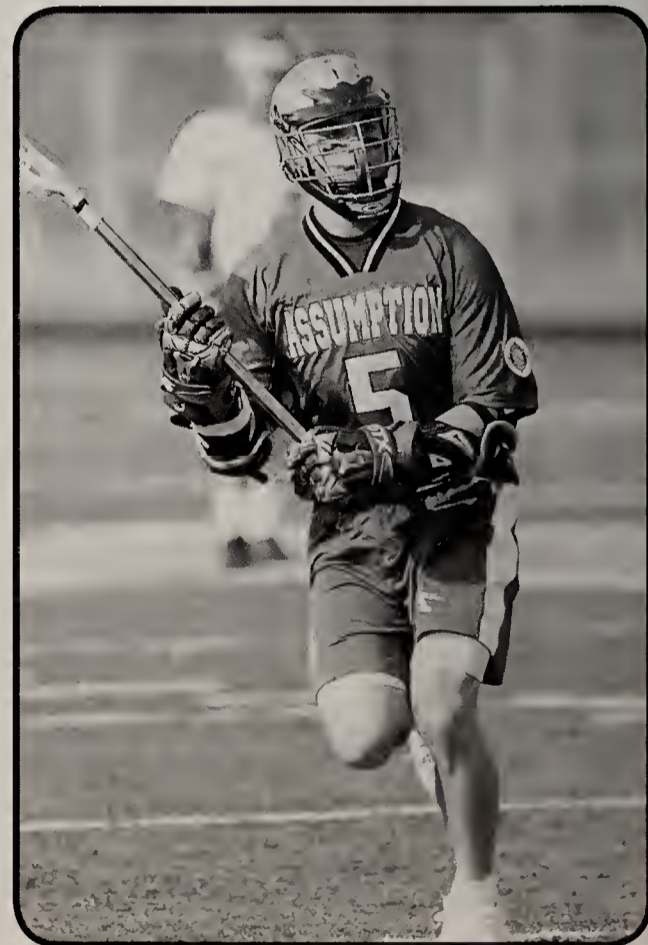

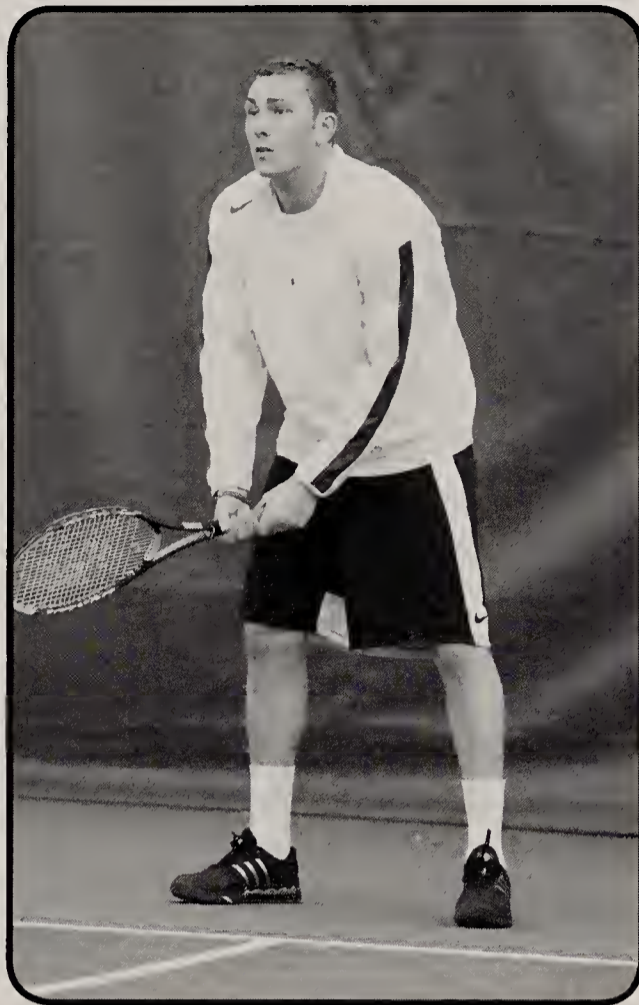

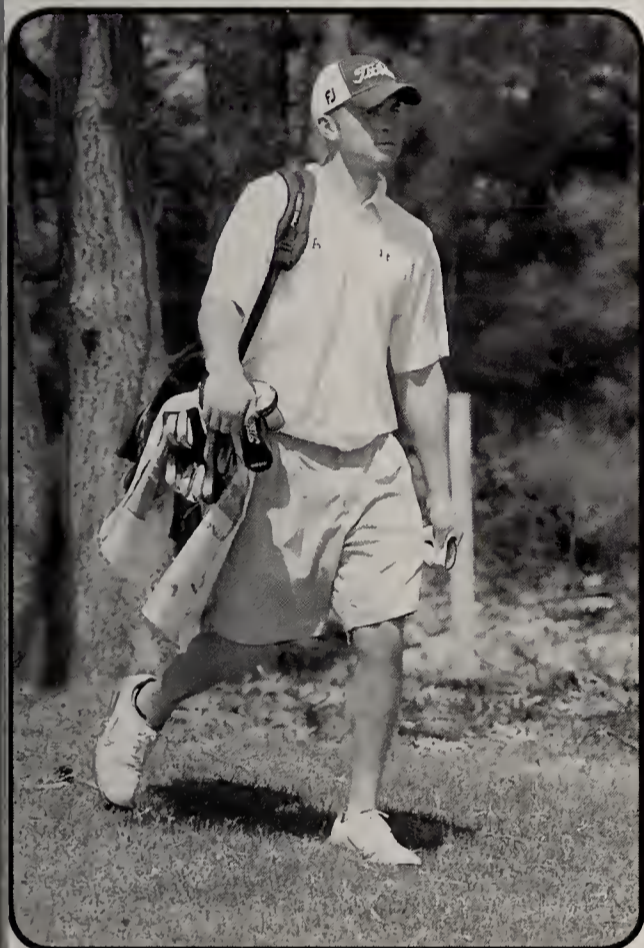

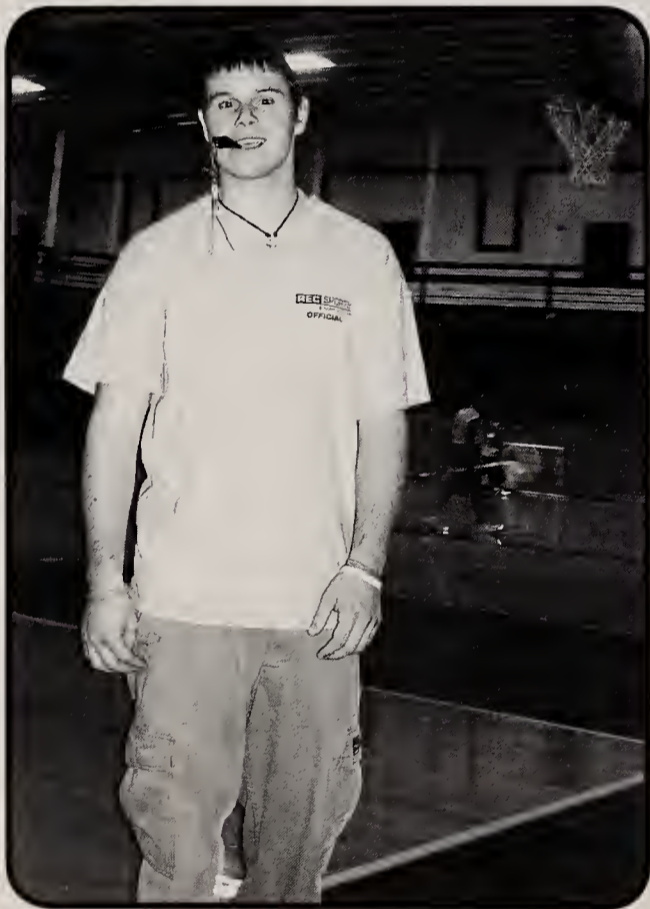

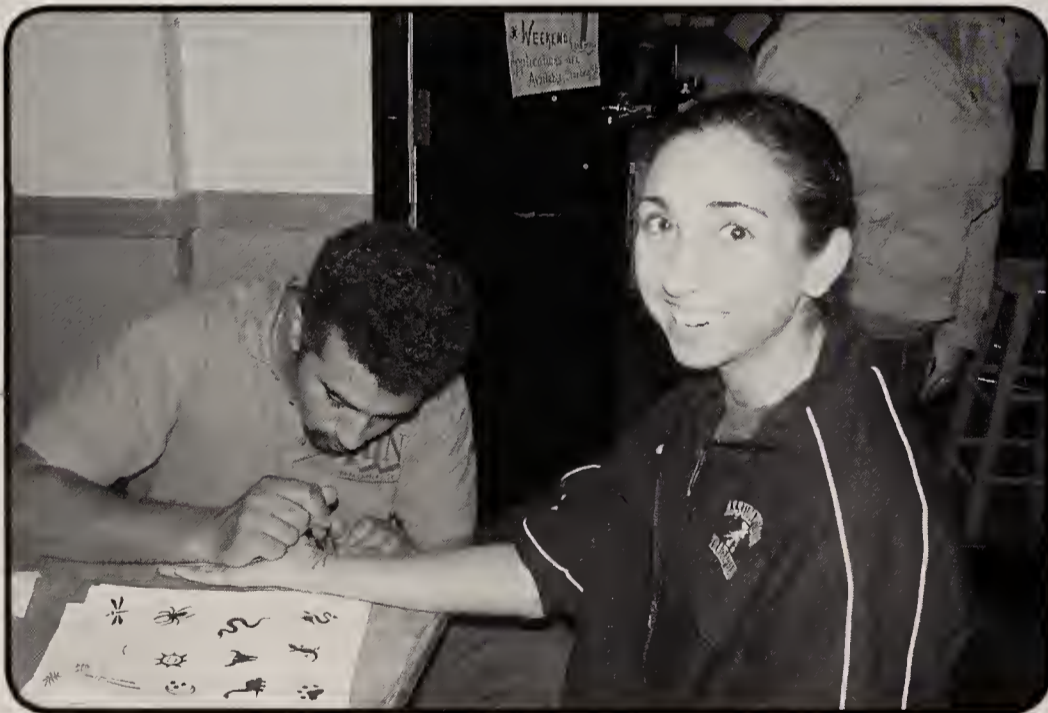

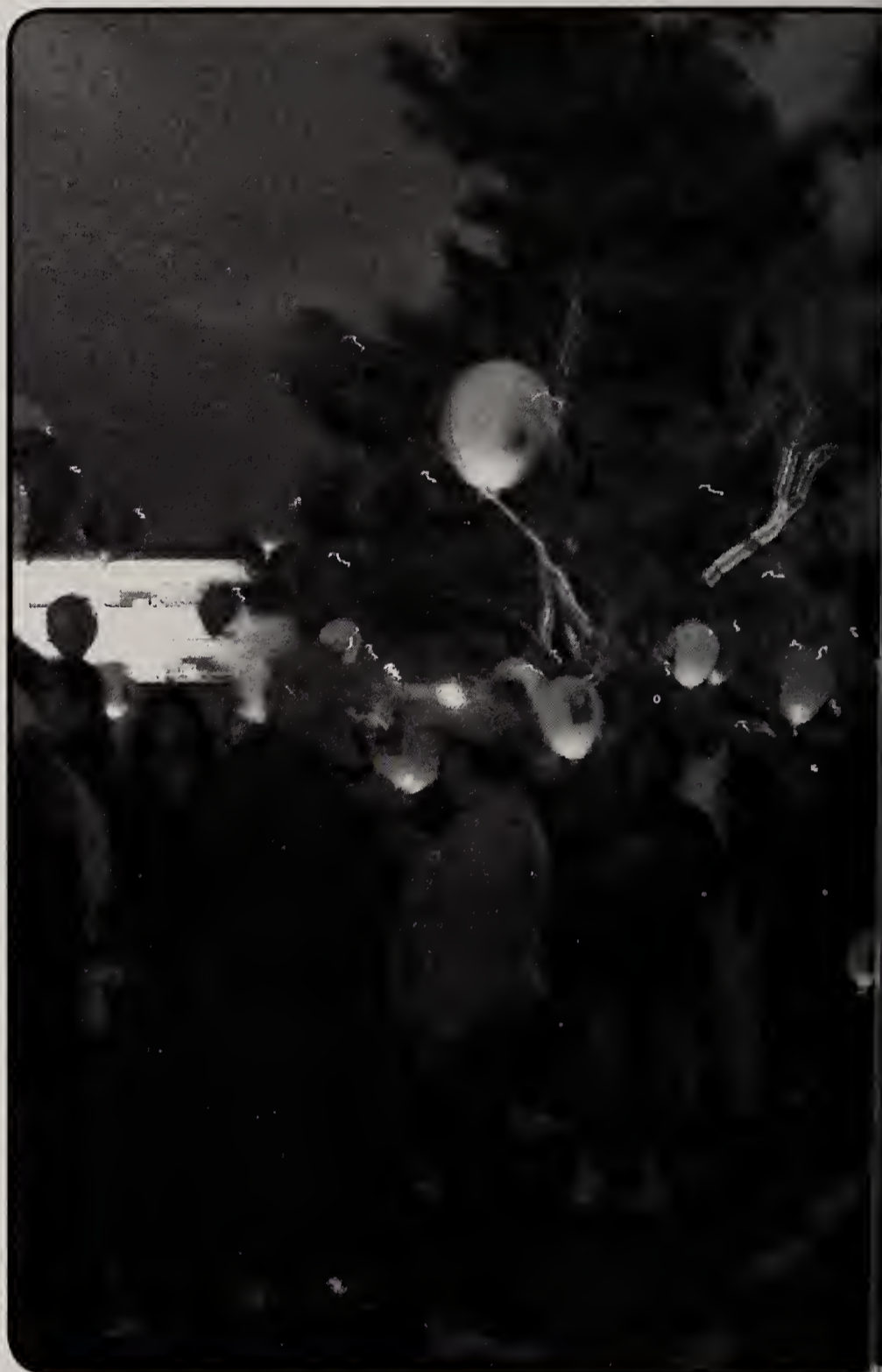

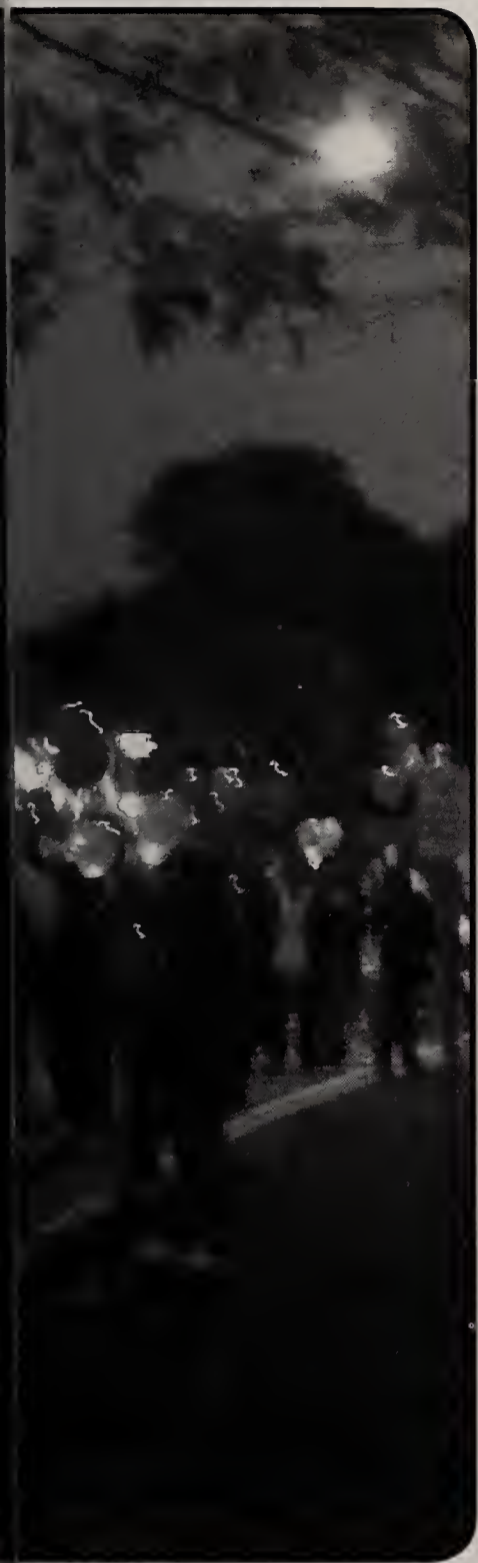

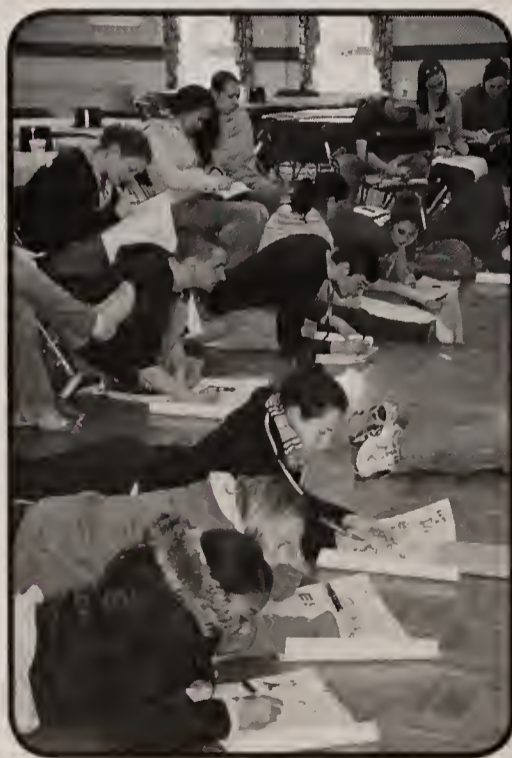

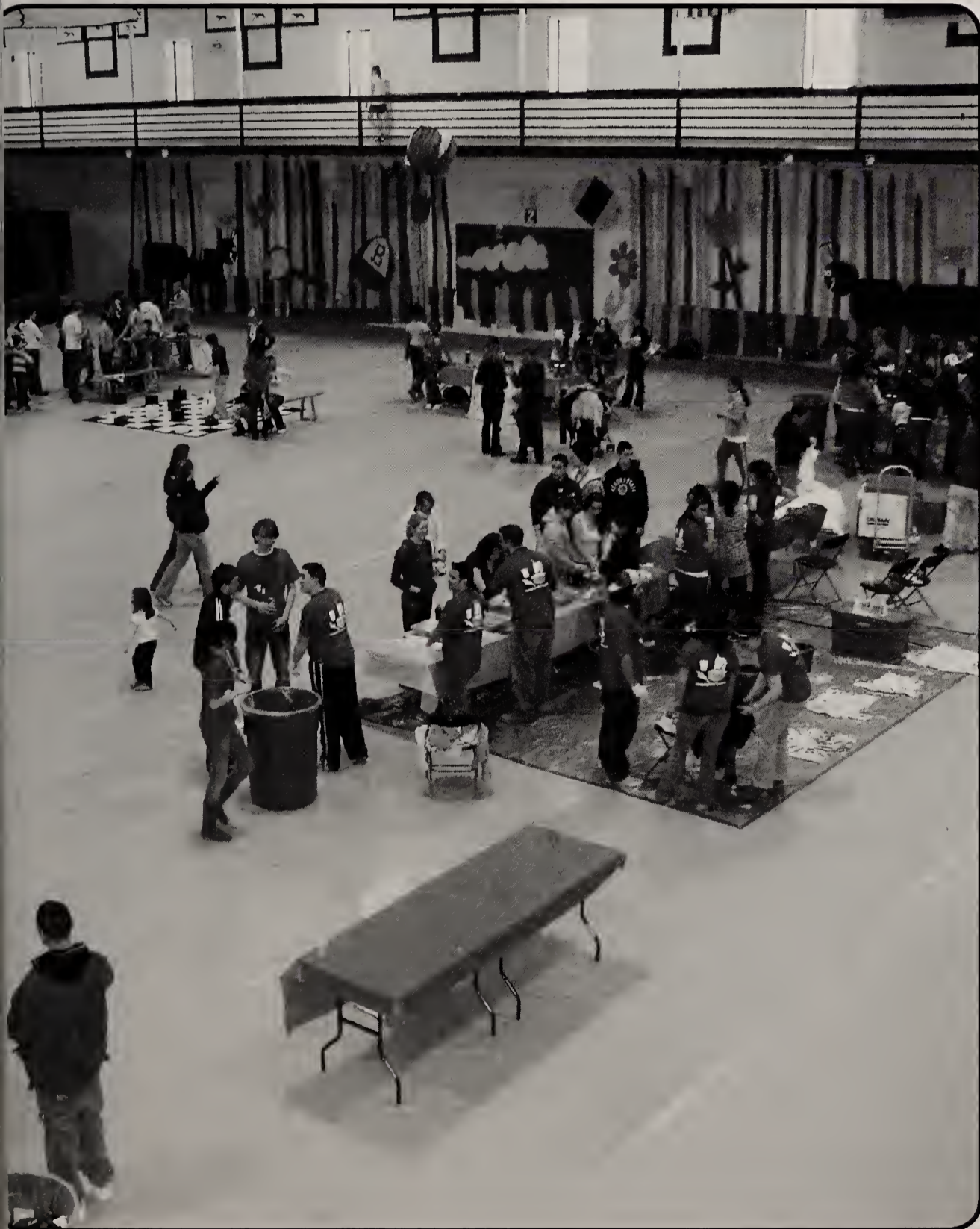

Those traveling to Baltimore built houses with Habitat for Humanity and served at a

soup kitchen known as "Paul's Place." The Religious of the Assumption sisters hosted groups in Philadelphia and Lansdale, PA, serving at a substance-abuse recovery center/nursing home, and ran an after-school program with those in Lansdale serving at Habitat for Humanity.

Those in Washington D.C. served as companions at a group home for people with developmental challenges, worked at an AIDS residence, and assisted at a local elementary school. People traveling to the Bronx rotated between helping out at an elementary school, tutoring in an ESL program, and creating a spring camp for neighborhood school children.

The service activities varied depending on the location, but regardless of where the students were, they made a difference in the lives of many people—having an impact on communities that stretched far beyond the gates of Salisbury Street. —*Luke Desautels, '07*

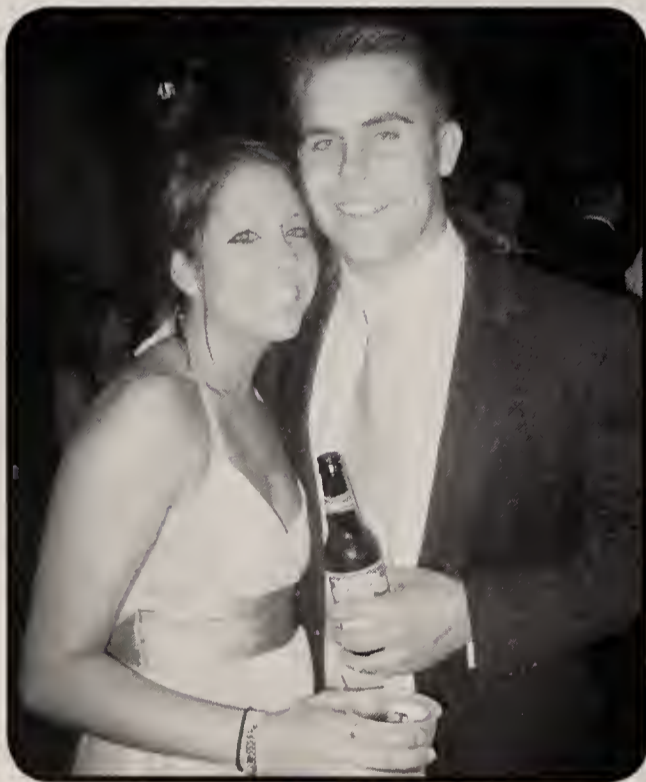

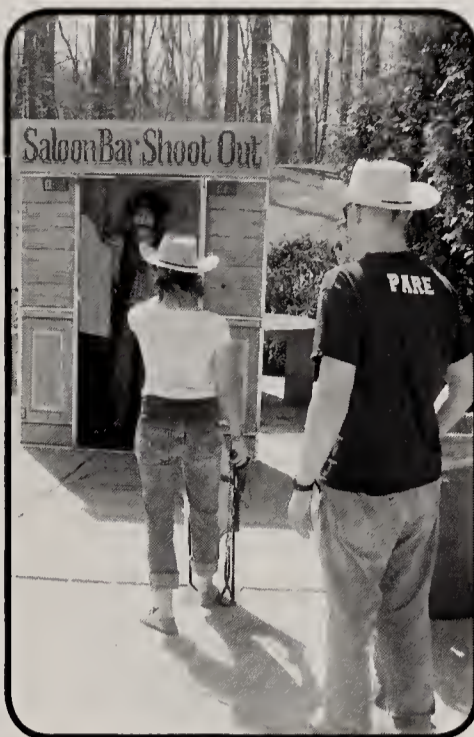

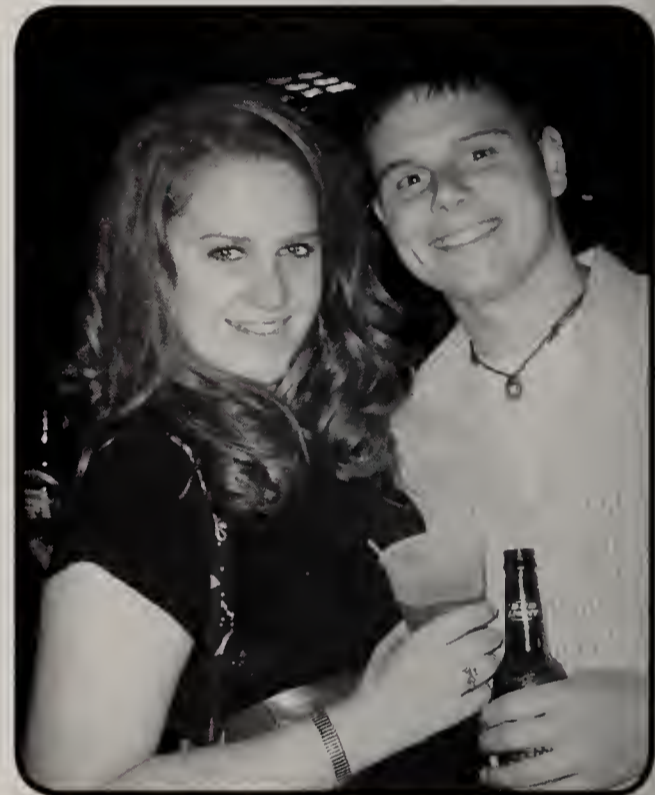

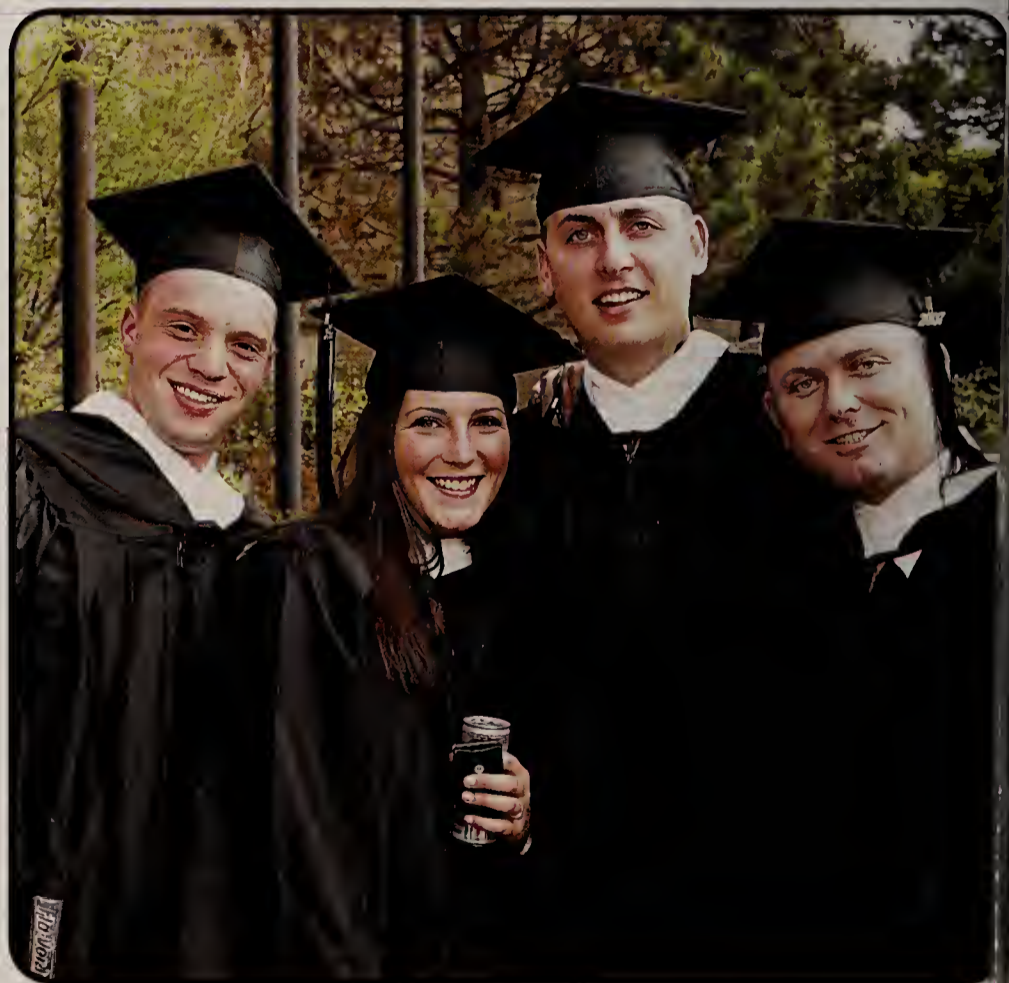
